MANAGER'S REPORT

Across central Texas, the bluebonnets are blooming on roadways, which means spring has finally arrived. With the warmer weather comes new projects at the Williamson County Landfill.

For the first half of 2024, we already have a lot going on. In January, we sponsored and attended the Hutto Chamber of Commerce Gala. Later this month, WM volunteers will be at the Spring HHW event. Beginning in Q2, we start a landfill gas collection system project, including installing multiple new wells. We also plan to construct a new seven-acre cell in Q2 of this year. As the spring progresses, we also plan to welcome volunteers from the Williamson County Chapter of the Native Plant Society of Texas (NPSOT) who will work on the pollinator garden at the landfill's entrance.
